Implementation Strategy

Introduction

Eisenhower Health is a nonprofit, comprehensive health care institution that includes the 437-bed Eisenhower Medical Center (EMC), the Barbara Sinatra Children's Center at Eisenhower and the Annenberg Center for Health Sciences at Eisenhower. The Betty Ford Center is also located on the Eisenhower campus but is an entirely independent organization. Situated on 106 acres in Rancho Mirage, and with outpatient clinics across the Coachella Valley, Eisenhower Health provides a full range of quality medical and educational services and is renowned for its Centers of Excellence in Orthopedics, Cardiovascular and Oncology.

In 2025, EMC conducted a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) in compliance with state and federal regulations guiding tax-exempt hospitals, assessing the significant health needs for the hospital service area. The CHNA and Implementation Strategy help guide the hospital's community health improvement programs and community benefit activities, as well as its collaborative efforts with organizations that share a mission to improve health. This Implementation Strategy explains how Eisenhower Health plans to address the significant health needs identified by the CHNA.

Report Adoption, Availability and Comments

This Implementation Strategy was adopted by the Eisenhower Health Board of Directors in June 2025.

Significant Health Needs

EMC's CHNA incorporated demographic and health data collected from a variety of local, county and state sources to present community demographics, social determinants of health, access to health care, birth characteristics, leading causes of death, acute and chronic disease, health behaviors, mental health, substance use and preventive practices. Analysis of secondary data included reporting health disparities for some health indicators. The report includes benchmark comparison data that measure the data findings as compared to Healthy People 2030 objectives, where appropriate.

Significant health needs were identified through this review of the secondary health data and validation through stakeholder surveys, which asked respondents to prioritize the significant health needs according to highest level of importance in the community. Survey participants included a broad range of stakeholders concerned with health and wellbeing in the Coachella Valley, who spoke to issues and needs in the communities served by the hospital.

The identified significant health needs included:

- Access to health care
- Chronic disease
- Dental care
- Economic instability
- Environmental pollution
- Food insecurity
- HIV/AIDS
- Housing and homelessness

- Mental health
- Overweight and obesity
- Preventive practices
- Substance use
- Unintentional injuries

Prioritized Health Needs the Hospital Will Address

Eisenhower Health examined the significant health needs and prioritized them with community stakeholder input. In addition, EMC applied the following criteria to identify the significant health needs it will address:

- Existing infrastructure: There are programs, systems, staff, and support resources in place to address the issue.
- Established partners: There are established relationships with community partners to address the issue.
- Ongoing investment: Existing resources are committed to the issue. Staff time and financial resources for this issue are counted as part of our community benefit effort.

As a result, Eisenhower Health will address the following health needs through a commitment of community benefit programs and charitable resources:

- Access to health care
- Chronic diseases
- Mental health and substance use
- Preventive practices (including injury prevention)

Strategies to Address Prioritized Health Needs

For each health need the hospital plans to address, the Implementation Strategy describes the following: actions the hospital intends to take, including programs and resources it plans to commit; anticipated impacts of these actions; and planned collaboration between the hospital and other organizations.

Access to Health Care

Goal: Increase access to health care for the medically underserved.

Strategies

1. Provide financial assistance through free and discounted care for health care services, consistent with the hospital's financial assistance policy.
2. Provide transportation support for established patients with transportation challenges to increase access to health care services.
3. Provide primary care services, health screenings, and vaccines.
4. Expand primary care options in the service area.
5. Communicate to service area residents how to access health care coverage options and primary care services.

Anticipated Impact

- Increase availability and access to health care.
- Provide financial assistance to qualified patients.
- Improve access to health care services by providing transportation assistance.
- Increase access to health education, outreach and community resources.

Chronic Diseases

Goal: Reduce the impact of chronic diseases on health and increase the focus on chronic disease prevention and treatment education.

Strategies

1. Provide chronic disease education, screening and treatment.
2. Provide support groups to assist those with chronic diseases, their families and caregivers.
3. Provide CPR and AED training.
4. Provide funding support to community organizations to support chronic disease prevention and treatment.
5. Provide nutrition consultations.

Anticipated Impact

- Increase availability and access to chronic disease prevention and management.
- Increase the identification and treatment of chronic disease.
- Increase public awareness of chronic disease prevention.
- Increase compliance with chronic disease prevention and management recommendations.

Goal: Increase the availability of mental health and substance use services in the community.

Strategies

1. Increase community awareness of prevention efforts and availability of resources to address mental health and substance use and misuse concerns.
2. Improve and expand access to mental health and substance use services.
3. Offer community health education, community lectures, presentations and workshops focused on mental health and substance use topics.

Anticipated Impact

- Increase the availability of mental health and substance use services in the community.
- Improve screening and identification of mental health and substance use needs.
- Improve coordination among health care providers and community resources and programs.

Since Eisenhower Health cannot directly address all the health needs present in the community, we will concentrate on those health needs that can most effectively be addressed given our areas of focus and expertise. Taking existing hospital and community resources into consideration, Eisenhower Health will not directly address the remaining significant health needs identified in the CHNA, including dental care, economic instability, environmental pollution, food insecurity, housing and homelessness, and overweight and obesity.
